## A Message from Fr Joseph

Dear Parishioners

What is the Holy Trinity?

It is most fundamental in our faith to understand God and Jesus and the Holy Spirit. Every day when we start with the cross, we mark ourselves with Trinity. In each Mass we profess our Creed, "I believe in One God, the Father, Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and all that is seen and unseen." We all concentrate on the visible sight and never look at the invisible. This is the first step to understanding the Holy Trinity. God the Father produced a perfect image of the Son, who is God from God, "consubstantial with the Father".

Father and the Son send love and communicate with us with the fresh power of the Holy Spirit. Let us reflect today on our journey and share in the divine life of the Creator who we are all destined to love.

The Holy Trinity is everything in how we live. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says of The Trinity: 232. "Christians are baptized 'in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit' (Mt 28)

"The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them. It is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the 'hierarchy of the truths of faith'. The whole history of salvation is identical with the history of the way and the means by which the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, reveals himself to people and reconciles and unites with himself those who turn away from sin. "The Trinity is a mystery of faith in the strict sense, one of the mysteries that are hidden in God."

**Sacraments**

- **Baptism:** Please contact the Parish Office to make prior booking. Subject to physical distancing and relevant directives.
- **Marriage:** Couples need to provide at least six months' notice and a preparation course is required. Subject to physical distancing and relevant directives.
- **Reconciliation:** The faithful are advised on the continuing importance of examination of conscience and making an act of contrition; the Sacrament of Reconciliation is available to parishioners by prior appointment. **The Sacrament of First Reconciliation will be celebrated for candidates enrolled in the 2020 program on Saturday 21 and 28 June. - REST IN GOD'S PRESENCE

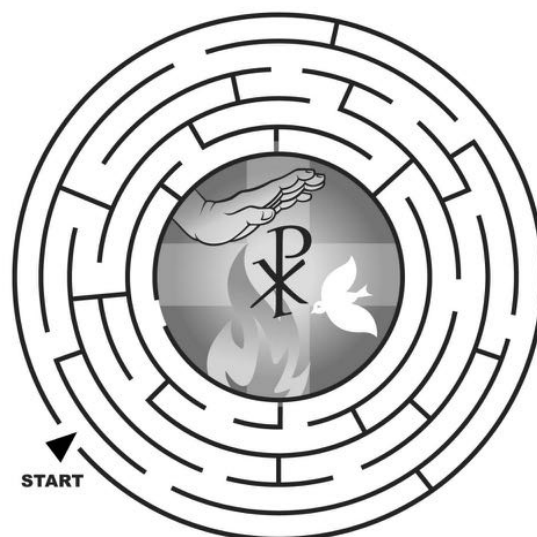
## 4th Joyful Mystery: Presentation of the Lord


will be pierced. She continues to trust God, not knowing what lies ahead. I pray for trust in God's plan and patience in waiting for it to unfold.

## Gospel

<p><b>Jn 3:16-18</b> A reading from the holy Gospel according to John <i>God sent his Son to save the world through him.</i></p> <p>Jesus said to Nicodemus, 'God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son.'</p>	
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## Reflection by Greg Sunter

At no point in the New Testament is the term 'Trinity' used. However, there are a number of scriptural references that led to this theological understanding: The Annunciation, the Baptism of Jesus and the great commissioning of the disciples to baptise in the name of the "Father, Son and Holy Spirit" are all examples of the three persons of God being recognised or active in the gospels. Today's second reading shows St Paul using the three experiences of God as a blessing of the people of Corinth. Every time we bless ourselves or begin prayer with the sign of the cross, we reaffirm our belief in the Trinity. That seemingly simple prayer, is, in fact, a confirmation of our belief in a triune God – three in one.

The Catechism (#266) affirms, "Now this is the Catholic faith: We worship one God in the Trinity and the Trinity in unity, without either confusing the persons or dividing the substance; for the person of the Father is one, the Son's is another, the Holy Spirit's another; but the Godhead of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit is one, their glory equal, their majesty coeternal"
