A Message from Fr Joseph

Happy Father's Day.

This Sunday I would like to refer to the second reading which is taken from St. Paul's letter to the Romans (13:8-10). He points out that all obligations are summed up in a single commandment: love your neighbour as yourself. At times we see this command to love as a single command but Paul in 1 Cor 13:4-7 brings out the complex nature of love.

I suggest that we do an examination of conscience on love today. Love is patient. Am I? Love is kind. Am I? Love is not arrogant. Am I? Love is not irritable. Am I? Love is not boastful. Am I? Love is not resentful. Am I? Love does not rejoice in what is wrong. How do I understand this? Love rejoices in the truth. Do I? Am I capable of selflessly rejoicing in the good fortune of others?

Jesus is gently reminding us that by being members of the church community, we are responsible for one another, and one of our tasks of love may be that of correcting our brother or sister who errs. This is never an easy task in our relativistic times, and our advice risks being rejected. Fraternal correction must always be inspired by real charity - it is one of the spiritual works of mercy. I pray to be given this love and the wisdom to find the right way to carry out this task of love. Because Jesus shares his own spirit with us, the connection between the community of believers and Jesus is very close: whatever we ask in union will be given to us by the Father. I ask for this insight and for a stronger faith in the presence of Jesus in the midst of the Church Eucharistic Celebration.



That little red light glowing near the Baptismal Font tells us that Jesus is present in the Eucharist Bread in the Tabernacle. We acknowledge His presence by genuflecting (touching our right knee to the ground). This is a sign of respect and an act of adoration of Jesus. Catholics usually genuflect towards the tabernacle as they enter and leave the church.


Child Protection Prayer

First Reading

Ez 33:7-9

A reading from the prophet Ezekiel If you have not warned the wicked man, then I will hold you responsible for his death.

The word of the Lord was addressed to me as follows, 'Son of man, I have appointed you as sentry to the House of Israel. When you hear a word from my mouth, warn them in my name. If I say to a wicked man: Wicked wretch, you are to die, and you do not speak to warn the wicked man to renounce his ways, then he shall die for his sin, but I will hold you responsible for his death. If, however, you do warn a wicked man to renounce his ways and repent, and he does not repent, then he shall die for his sin, but you yourself will have saved your life.'

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Love is the fulfilment of the Law.

Avoid getting into debt, except the debt of mutual love. If you love your fellow men you have carried out your obligations. All the commandments: You shall not commit adultery, you shall not kill, you shall not steal, you shall not covet, and so on, are summed up in this single command: You must love your neighbour as yourself. Love is the one thing that cannot hurt your neighbour; that is why it is the answer to every one of the commandments.

Gospel

Mt 18:15-20

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew If your brother or sister listens to you, you will have won that person back.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'



Reflection by Mary Coloe

The passage gives us a small glimpse into the life of one early Christian community. Obviously, it was a community that had its difficulties and struggles, hence Matthew's need to offer a way of handling disagreements within the community. Most commentators believe that Matthew's audience were once Jews who converted to Christianity. Therefore, they were a community who were used to praying in a *minyan* - a group of ten (men), without which the communal prayer could not take place. Now, within a smaller Christian community it may be more difficult to gather such a group so Matthew offers further pastoral advice that Jesus is present when only a small number gather – even just two people. As we glimpse some of the struggles within Matthew's community this may provide a source of encouragement for our own communities as we face the difficulties of "being Church" in our time. And, above all, remember Jesus' promise – he is Emmanuel, God with us – even when it might seem God is distant. How much more relevant is this passage during the COVID crisis when we gathered with our families to read the Scriptures or view Mass online. Jesus' message is for you.... "There I am with you."
