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A Message from Fr Joseph

Dear Friends

Isaiah used the image of the vineyard to represent God's love for his people. Christ used this image to reveal the social mechanisms in which He is a victim.

Jesus does not stop at the fate of the vineyard itself, but at the deals that exist between the owner and the mercenaries and workers. The owner made a deal, the mercenaries signed it and he went far away. However, when the profit was distributed, the employees turned out to be dishonest. Not only did they not stick to the deal, but they hit the owner's son. We can easily apply today's Gospel to our professional systems. As business owners, directors or ordinary employers, do we care about the honesty of the contract itself and its observance?

This question is also valid in the opinion of employers who do not believe in God. Their dishonesty must be taken into account. Jesus does not hesitate to speak of his Father as an employer and sets him as an example for everyone. Another set of questions relates to employees. Are we honest, do we keep the contract, is our relationship with the employer based on wise trust? How often do we face injustice..... Then, as disciples of Christ, do we remember the contract with us and the fact that the employer can fail? But Jesus will never fail; he is present in your life. It is God who will reward the integrity of the service and work. The workplace and the arrangements that prevail in it, should always reflect the Gospel values to which we espouse.







Parish Notices

Holy Father's Appeal 2020



Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary - 7 October

October is the month of the Holy Rosary which brings great peace and holiness to your life. The Rosary is a memorial of the Virgin Mary as honoured and combines the salutation of the angel Gabriel (Luke 1:28) with meditation on the saving mysteries of Christ. It is a powerful instrument for conversion and is the best method of honouring Mary. It protects the Church from false teachings and keeps her safe from the attacks of the enemy. The Church encourages the faithful to pray the Rosary daily during this month. The Church established the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary (October 7th) in 1573 in thanksgiving for a Christian victory over the Ottoman forces at Lepanto.

<p>Is 5:1-7 A reading from the prophet Isaiah <i>The vineyard of the Lord God of hosts is the House of Israel.</i></p> <p>Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me. What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead? Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn. I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress.</p>	<p>(R.) The vineyard of the Lord is the House of Israel.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. You brought a vine out of Egypt; to plant it you drove out the nations. It stretched out its branches to the sea, to the Great River it stretched out its shoots. (R.) 2. Then why have you broken down its walls? It is plucked by all who pass by. It is ravaged by the boar of the forest, devoured by the beasts of the field. (R.) 3. God of hosts, turn again, we implore, look down from heaven and see. Visit this vine and protect it, the vine your right hand has planted. (R.) 4. And we shall never forsake you again: give us life that we may call upon your name. God of hosts, bring us back; let your face shine on us and we shall be saved. (R.) 	<p>Phil 4:6-9 A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians <i>Do these things and the God of peace will be with you.</i></p> <p>There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving, and that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts, in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers, fill your minds with everything that is true, everything that is noble, everything that is good and pure, everything that we love and honour, and everything that can be thought virtuous or worthy of praise. Keep doing all the things that you learnt from me and have been taught by me and have heard or seen that I do. Then the God of peace will be with you.</p>

Gospel

Mt 21:33-43
A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew
He leased his vineyard to other farmers.

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:
It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone.
This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?
'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'



Reflection by Greg Sunter

Matthew's whole recount of this parable is dependent upon the hearer's familiarity with earlier writings within the Old Testament. The original audience would have drawn on their own familiarity with the texts and recognised Jesus' words as echoing those of Isaiah and the psalmist. Jesus' audience would have known that the law was always on the side of a landowner over his tenants. Any misdeed by a tenant farmer would have been dealt with swiftly and severely and yet the landowner in Jesus' story (God) is almost unbelievably patient and prepared to give the tenants every opportunity to do the right thing.
