## A Message from Fr Joseph

Our God has once again put together a set of holy texts for today which address precisely what we as His people need. This message speaks directly to our current frustrations and perhaps even to our fears and hopelessness. It challenges us to step back and view our world as God sees it and then to respond as he would respond.

The Jewish people had been going through incredible hardships in Egypt and the Lord was now providing deliverance for them. As they left Egypt, however, their troubles did not all of a sudden come to an end. There continued to be challenges, each of which resulted in many losing their focus upon God and His many blessings. Their focus turned to themselves, complaining about how unfair their circumstances seemed to be. With Covid and everything else that we are encountering today, it certainly seems that we have much in common with those Israelites.

So how did God choose to respond?

He simply, patiently reminded them how they should be living their lives – by focusing on the needs of others. Those others, perhaps that might translate to those in our lives with differing viewpoints, those facing crises today both medically and financially, and those with basic food, clothing, and shelter needs. God reminds them and us that He hears the cries of those in need and that there are consequences if we fail to show compassion. Should we question our ability to respond with love and compassion when we ourselves might be facing similar challenges? The Responsorial Psalm reminds us from where our strength is derived – our Lord who is our rock, and our strength. The Alleluia goes on to promise that if we keep the Lord's word, then the Father will love us and will come to us – we will never be alone as we seek to follow Jesus. May God Bless us...

**Milk For Mates**








## Safeguarding our Parish



## Feast of Saints Simon and Jude

Today's Saint Jude (or Judas) was often confused with his evil contemporary. Since Judas Iscariot was so despised and ignored, and since he shared a name with the good Jude, a tradition gathered over the centuries of petitioning today's saint only when all other saints had failed to answer one's prayers. Saint Jude became the Patron Saint of Hopeless Causes. Saint Simon the Apostle is called the "Zealot" in Saint Luke's Gospel. This may describe his zeal for the house of the Lord, a virtue. As Apostles, they were key in laying the deep foundations of the Church in the rock-solid substrata of the Middle Eastern culture in which they lived. Their feast day is celebrated on 28 October.



*Saints Simon and Jude, we ask for your intercession in heaven as members of the Twelve Apostles. Approach the Lord Jesus with our needs in your hands. Answer the prayers we present. Fulfill the petitions we seek. Amen.*

## Gospel

**Mt 22:34-40**  
A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew  
*You shall love the Lord your God and your neighbour as yourself.*

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, ‘Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?’ Jesus said, ‘You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.’



## Reflection by Greg Sunter

The question and response that we see in this gospel passage was a common form of scholarly debate in the Jewish tradition. The Pharisees ask Jesus which of the commandments is the greatest. Jesus responds by directly quoting the commandment from the ancient scriptures. His reply, ‘You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind,’ comes directly from Deuteronomy 6:4. Further, Jesus’ followup, ‘you must love your neighbour as yourself,’ comes from Leviticus 19:18. Deuteronomy and Leviticus are two of the first five books of the Bible that make up the Jewish Torah, or Law. Jesus’ words call us to love our neighbour as ourselves. We are called to treat others as we would like to be treated ourselves. To be able to do this, we need to picture ourselves in their place – experiencing all that they are experiencing; not imposing our own values and circumstances. To see ourselves in the place of another is the key to responding with compassion. The origin of the word ‘compassion’ means experiencing with. If we are able to truly ‘experience with’ another person perhaps then we can genuinely recognise and respond to their needs.
