A Message from Fr Joseph

By Baptism all sins are forgiven, Original Sin and all personal sins, and temporal punishment due to sin is removed. After one has been reborn in Christ, there is nothing to prevent one's entry into God's Kingdom. However, though all sins are removed, there remains, an effect of Original Sin. The effects of Original Sin need not harm us so long as we seek strength to resist them through the Sacrament of Penance, the Sacrament of the Eucharist, prayer, a deepening spirituality, growth in virtue, and a wholehearted dependence on God. Baptism also gives us new life as adopted children of God. We become sharers of divine life and temples of the Holy Spirit. Our permanence in the state of grace is called sanctifying grace because God "sanctifies" us, that is, makes us his holy people by giving us his life. God continues to assist us in many ways that are actually called graces. Thus, we have the ability to live and act under the guidance and light of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. This helps us mature in goodness through the practice of virtues, such as the Cardinal Virtues: prudence, justice, temperance, and fortitude.

By Baptism we become members of the Church, the Body of Christ. We share in the priesthood of Christ as well as his prophetic and royal mission. "You are 'a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises' of him who called you out of darkness into his light" (1 Pt 2:9). We enjoy the community we find in the Church, share our talents and gifts with its members, respond willingly to its teachings and requirements, and assume the responsibilities that our membership implies.

Baptism provides a common foundation among all Christians, including those not yet in full communion with the Catholic Church. The Church recognizes the validity of Baptism in other Christian Churches as long as the rite included the pouring of or immersion in water, a Trinitarian formula, and the intention to baptize. Those who have been baptized have been saved by their faith in Christ and the grace of Baptism. "They therefore have a right to be called Christians and with good reason are accepted as brothers and sisters by the children of the Catholic Church".

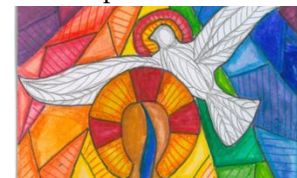

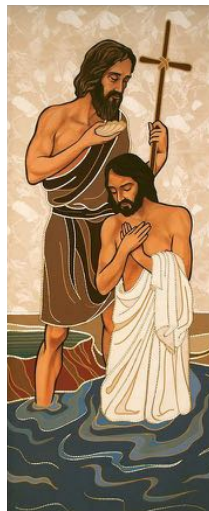

Did you know?

- Jesus was baptised as an adult (scholars guess at around 30 years old).
- St. John the Baptist baptised him.
- The baptism is often depicted with the pouring of water by a shell.
- He was baptised in the River Jordan.
- The heavens opened and the Holy Spirit descended like a dove.
- A voice came from heaven saying "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."
- Jesus' baptism is considered the beginning of his public ministry.
- Directly following his baptism, Jesus was led by the Spirit to the desert where he was tempted for 40 days (what our season of Lent is based on).
- Common symbols of baptism: water, dove, shell, candle.

COVID Update

The newly introduced restrictions have required us to make a few changes to our Covid Safe Plan.

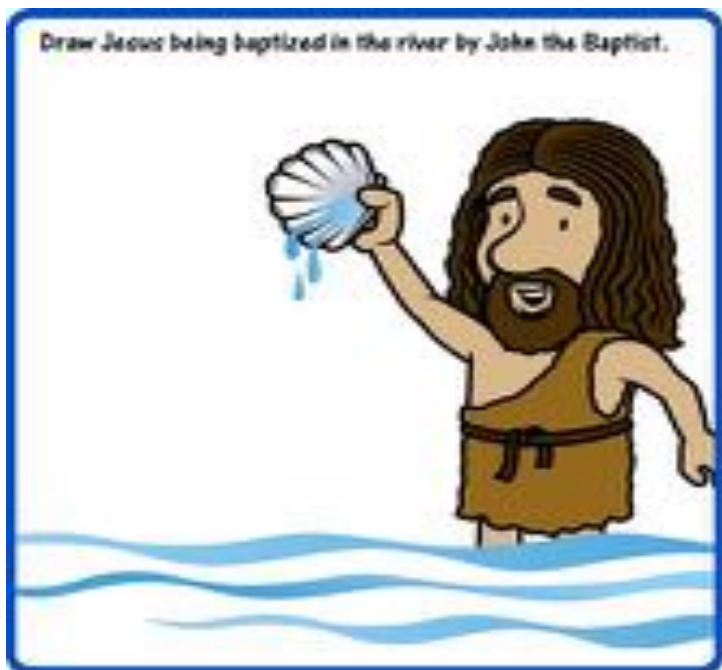

The Baptism of the Lord



This Sunday the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Baptism of Our Lord. This brings to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the River Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes. In the Eastern Church this feast is called Theophany because at the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was a sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves," He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world." Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism are symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid actual sin.

- We are granted justification or sanctifying grace**
When we're baptised, our original sin is forgiven and, in the case of adults, personal sins.
- We receive the three theological virtues**
Faith, hope and charity, the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the other virtues are received.
- We receive the sacramental grace**
It offers the necessary help to live a Christian life. It makes us capable of believing in God, of waiting on Him and loving Him.
- A sacramental character is imprinted in us**
It is an indelible spiritual mark that is imprinted during Baptism. It makes us part of the Church, Body of Christ.
- It makes us part of the common priesthood of the faithful**
Participation is in two forms: active, through evangelization and sanctifying all temporal realities and passive, by receiving the other sacraments.

<p>Mk 1:7-11 A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark <i>You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.</i></p> <p>In the course of his preaching John the Baptist said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.' It was at this time that Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptised in the Jordan by John. No sooner had he come up out of the water than he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit, like a dove, descending on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.'</p> 

Reflection by Greg Sunter
<p>The baptism of Jesus in the gospel of Mark serves as a revelation of the identity of Jesus. Throughout this gospel there is secrecy about who Jesus really is. Whenever a person's faith reveals that Jesus is the Messiah or the Son of God, Jesus commands them to remain silent and not tell anyone else about him. However, through the baptism event, the reader is let in to the secret from the outset. Unlike the public announcements of Jesus as the beloved Son of God that occurs in other gospels, in the gospel of Mark, the voice is addressed to Jesus himself and there is no indication that anyone else hears it. The words used are, 'You are my Son' not, 'This is my Son.' But the reader is placed in the privileged position of knowing the truth about Jesus from the very beginning of the gospel. As they read further, they observe the disciples' growing yet imperfect understanding of this truth.</p>
